I have been plagued with multiple sclerosis for about six years, a very painful, progressive disease. Walking has become nearly impossible for me. On good days, I can walk short distances; if I exceed that distance, my body will shut down as I pass out. On bad days, when I am feeling especially ill, I cannot even take one step.

I attend Greater Life Apostolic Church in Middletown, Kentucky. My pastor is Rev. G. Alan Browning. He and my church have seen me suffer with this disease and have continually supported me in prayer and fasting. Rev. Lee Stoneking was scheduled to preach at the Kentucky District UPCI Family Camp. Following the Sunday night service just before camp began, my pastor told me of his wishes for me to go to camp and allow Rev. Stoneking to pray for me.

Riding in a vehicle is very painful for me, and seems to sap all my energy. I knew the two hour ride to Summersville would be a difficult one, but I made up my mind that it would be well worth the sacrifice. On the

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way there, the ride became so painful to me that I was grating my teeth. I almost told my daughter to go back because I couldn't take it, but I perservered on.

Once the service reached the phase of seeking around the altar, I asked my daughter to push me in my wheelchair to the front. My pastor got Bro. Stoneking's attention and asked him to pray for me. He began praying and rebuking the disease, then he asked me if I could walk at all. As he escorted me, he and I walked a great distance across the tabernacle floor. When we reached that limited distance that I can walk, I felt that sensation I feel when I pass out. I must have paused in my walking, because Bro. Stoneking sensed a change in me and said, "No, we can't stop now. We have to go on." By faith I continued. The sensation that I would pass out ceased, and we walked even farther! Trust me, the walk I had with Bro. Stoneking and Jesus was unlike any walk I have ever taken. While we walked, hundreds of my sisters and brothers, whom I don't even know, cheered us on. I wondered if the onlookers realized what was happening. The Creator had stepped down on that floor and told my disease, "Enough is enough. Fear, you have to leave now." Jesus healed me of the passing out symptom! I felt the sensation leave, and I knew it would not return!

Two days later, I took yet another walk. We have lived in my home for nearly two years, and I have never been able to walk to the end of my driveway to retrieve my mail. That day, I did! There may be days when I won't be able to walk as far, but I am not going to pass out. I now even have more freedom in my worship! Along with the passing out symptom had come a lot of fear. I was reserved in my worship because of that fear. When I returned to my church the following weekend, I gave my worship and all I had to the Lord. I left exhausted, but the fear of passing out was gone.

I will never forget this walk: I took the walk, and Jesus healed me of passing out! But, my healing is not complete. I am still seeking Him for the remainder of my healing; I have faith it will happen.

The only walk that will ever supersede this walk will be the walk through the pearly gates, as I view my Savior's face and bow to worship Him. When I take that final walk, every symptom of my multiple sclerosis will be gone, but that won't mean as much to me as seeing His wonderful face and hearing him say, "Well done."
